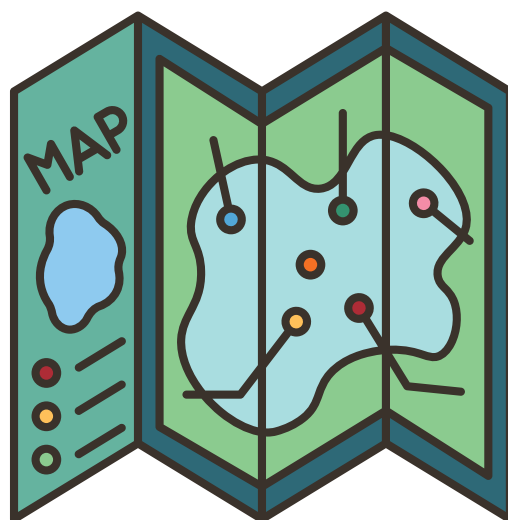
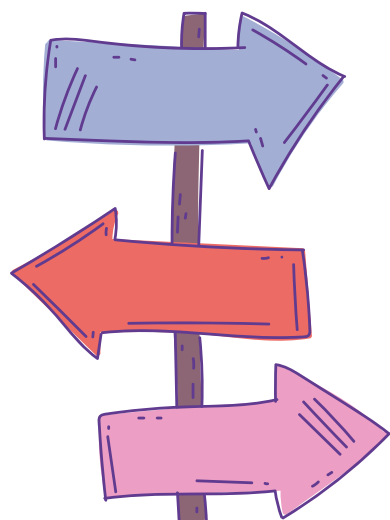

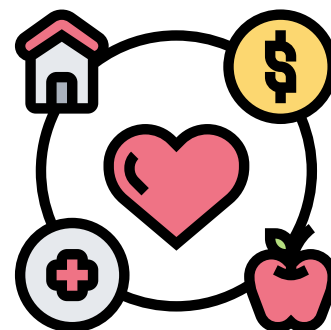

Alberta-Specific Social Benefits

Alberta Works Income Support

Alberta Works provides financial assistance to individuals and families who are in temporary financial need. This program can help with basic living expenses, such as food, clothing, and shelter

Eligibility: Low-income individuals and families.

How to Apply: Visit an Alberta Works office or apply online.

Real-Life Example: Ahmed, a newcomer from Egypt, applied for Alberta Works Income Support after losing his job. With financial assistance, he was able to cover his rent and groceries while searching for new employment.

Alberta Child and Family Benefit (ACFB)

The ACFB is a tax-free benefit paid to lower-income families with children under 18 years of age. It helps with the cost of raising children.

Eligibility: Families with children under 18 and a household income below a certain threshold.

How to Apply: Automatically assessed when you file your taxes.

Real-Life Example: Maria, a single mother from the Philippines, received the ACFB to help pay for her children's school supplies and extracurricular activities.



Alberta Health Coverage

The Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan (AHCIP) provides coverage for medically necessary services, such as doctor visits and hospital care.

Eligibility: All Alberta residents.

How to Apply: Apply online or in person at an Alberta Registry office.

Link: Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan Rent Supplement Program (Alberta)

This program helps low-income individuals and families afford rental housing by providing a subsidy to cover part of the rent.

Eligibility: Low-income individuals and families.

How to Apply: Contact your local housing office or apply through a participating landlord.

Real-Life Example: Amira, a newcomer from Syria, applied for rental assistance through Alberta's Rent Supplement Program. She submitted her income documents and was approved within a month, reducing her rent by \$300.

Local Resources and Support

Calgary Immigrant Women's Association (CIWA): Offers settlement services, language training, and employment support. Visit CIWA

Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers (EMCN):

Provides settlement services, language classes, and employment assistance. Visit EMCN
Alberta Food Banks: Find your local food bank for emergency food support. Find a Food Bank

Affordable Housing Programs in Alberta

Canada Child Benefit (CCB)

Financial Assistance Canada Child Benefit (CCB)



The CCB is a tax-free monthly payment made to eligible families to help with the cost of raising children under 18 years of age.

Goods and Services Tax/Harmonized Sales Tax (GST/HST) Credit.

The GST/HST credit is a quarterly payment that helps offset the taxes paid on goods and services. It is available to low- and modest-income individuals and families.



Alberta Works Income Support

Alberta Works provides financial assistance to individuals and families who are in temporary financial need. This program can help with basic living expenses, such as food, clothing, and shelter.



Employment Insurance (EI)

EI provides temporary financial assistance to individuals who have lost their jobs through no fault of their own, are sick, pregnant, or caring for a newborn or adopted child.

Old Age Security (OAS) and Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS)
OAS and GIS are benefits available to seniors aged 65 and older to help with living expenses.
